SPRINGING INTO SERVICE

Commissioners,

The success of Bring Your Kids to Work Day increases. Not only was the 2nd Annual a chance to show our families where we work, it was also a day to inspire the next generation of leaders. It's a wonderful effort that showcases how a passion for service can make a positive impact in the world.

Three crucial Health and Human Services (H&HS) events took place. The first, Spring Fling Outreach, brought more than 30 agencies together at the Fairgrounds, and connected over 140 people with needed services. This was a significant increase from the roughly 100 attendees at prior events, and more in line with pre-COVID participation. The department also hosted two housing events. The Housing Policy Forum brought together professional panelists to discuss local strategies for housing policy, especially affordability issues. A collaborative Housing Fair offered one-stop resources, free to the public, addressing financial-wellness and ownership options.

In Fire Rescue's public-safety arena, you've seen two new fire-engine push-in ceremonies, with two more expected in the next 30 days.

And a long-awaited infrastructure milestone has taken place. The Army Corps of Engineers awarded a \$27 million contract to Weeks Marine for the initial construction and extension of 2.6 miles of critically eroded shoreline. A June 17 ground-breaking ceremony is planned. Congratulations on this next undertaking for the health of the dunes and beaches!

T-HANGAR CONSTRUCTION - This project is complete. Hoyle Tanner & Associates (aviation consultant) and Airport staff are in the process of project closeout. Airport Administration began moving new tenants into the new T-Hangar facility. *Project Cost*:\$6,544,136 (90% FDOT, 10% Airport)


AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL TOWER EQUIPMENT - CNCTech (contractor) has completed installation of the tower and the AWOS sensors. The electric and ATCT connections will be completed next. The project is anticipated to be completed in May and Airport staff will begin project closeout. *Project Cost* \$340,669 (100% FDOT)

TAXIWAY A - New main gate, fencing and concrete entrance driveway were constructed in April. The fence contractor is waiting for additional parts for the walk-thru gate. The project is anticipated to be completed in May and Airport staff will begin project closeout. Halifax Paving (contractor) has finalized the as-built survey. *Project Cost:* \$3,496,125 (90% FAA, 8% FDOT, 2% Airport)

GENERAL AVIATION TERMINAL RAMP - Project was in pavement-curing stage during April. New striping will be applied next. This project is in the final stages of completion. *Project Cost:* \$3,875,778 (90% FAA, 8% FDOT, 2% Airport)







ENGINEERING UPDATES COASTAL PROJECTS MAR-APR

ACOE/ FDOT PROJECTS CITY OF FLAGLER BEACH

Bid opening was April 4. Weeks Marine was selected as the Contractor, providing the lowest bid, \$27,095,900.

This was below the original cost estimate of \$33,500,000 which was used to determine the local match share

The difference, or 'extra' local match share will be held until close-out of the project and, if there are no contingencies, will be refunded to the County.

Weeks Marine will be awarded the contract by the USACE on May 2, 2024 and construction is planned to begin in late June. The construction duration is expected to be 3-4 months (weather dependent during hurricane season).

FUNDING STUDY SURVEY

The County-wide Beach Management Plan Funding Survey was conducted between February 12 and March 6.

A complete report will be provided to the County Administration and staff in May and the results will be presented to the BOCC during the Budget Workshop on June 3.

Preliminary results indicate that the survey received an excellent response rate and that the residents of Flagler County consider the beaches to be an important and valuable asset to the County, and there is a willingness to pay for restoring and maintaining the beaches throughout the County.

PERMIT MODIFICATION: EXTEND BEACH NOURISHMENT PERMIT FROM THE CITY OF FLAGLER BEACH THROUGH BEVERLY BEACH AND PAINTER'S HILL

This project is Phase 2 in the Beach Nourishment Plan which will provide an additional ~5.9 miles of beach nourishment. Permit modification and construction will be funded using FEMA Category G Public Assistance and/or FDEP Recovery Funds from Hurricanes Ian and Nicole. It extends the existing beach nourishment permit between R-80 - R-64.5, up to approximately R-46, just north of Varn Park.

Engineering analysis and field work for permitting requirements and documentation are in progress. Permit application will be submitted by July 1.

The new permit modification will allow for a beach nourishment project similar to the Modified USACE Federal project and will extend from the northern end of the USACE project at 7th Street North, to Varn Park, and taper north into Hammock Dunes HOA.

The project is expected to begin in late 2024 / early 2025 depending on regulatory review time, and issuance of permits and BOEM Lease Agreement.





LABOR FORCE RESIDING IN FLAGLER COUNTY




