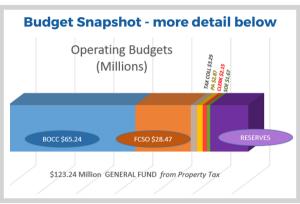

# FLAGLER COUNTY OCTOBER EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: PROJECT MILESTONES BEING MET, LOOKING FORWARD TO FISCAL YEAR 2021/22

Flagler County on September 20 adopted a total budget of \$221.09 million at a millage rate of 8.4847 which is 0.1000 mills lower than last year's millage rate. This includes: the General Fund millage of 8.0297; the voter approved millage rates for the Environmentally Sensitive Lands Operating budget at 0.1250, the Environmentally Sensitive Lands Debt Service millage at 0.1250; and, the General Obligation Bonds millage for the Judicial Center at 0.2050.

The General Fund - the monies that come from property taxes - is \$123.24 million. The Board of County Commissioners Operating Budget is \$65.24 million. The Flagler County Sheriff's Office receives \$28.47 million. The Tax Collector receives \$3.29 million. The Property Appraiser receives \$2.87 million, while the Clerk of Courts receives \$2.15 million, and the Supervisor of Elections receives \$1.67 million.

The Emergency Management Department continues to support local COVID-19 activities such as vaccinations, testing, and treatment options as they are needed in the community. It also transitioned the Florida Health Department-Flagler to Cattlemen's Hall in August to improve efficiency of the COVID-related services it provides.

As Florida is in the peak of hurricane season, the Emergency Management Department conducted six training events including: Activation Call Center Manager; Volunteer Radio Communications; FEMA Individual Assistance; ICS-100 Introduction to Incident Command System (required for all new hires); Community Organizations Assisting in Disasters; and, G-400 Advanced Incident Command.

The Engineering Department continues to work with the Westside Storm Water Master Plan consultant, Geosyntec, to provide a revised stormwater master plan scope. It incorporates public and stakeholder meetings, and expands the scope of National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) to address the expanded geography necessitated by impending NPDES permit. Some data and assessment tasks (including water quality assessment) were expanded to cover additional area.

Visible work can be seen along State Road 100, east of Interstate 95, where the construction of the Graham Swamp Multi-Use Trail & Pedestrian Bridge is underway. The 1.6 mile project, from the Lehigh Trail to 100 is about 4% complete. The contractor is clearing and grubbing, and installed erosion control devices. - Heidi Petito

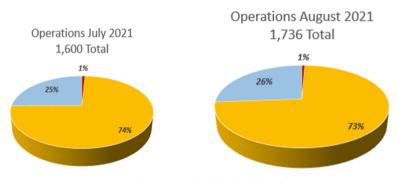

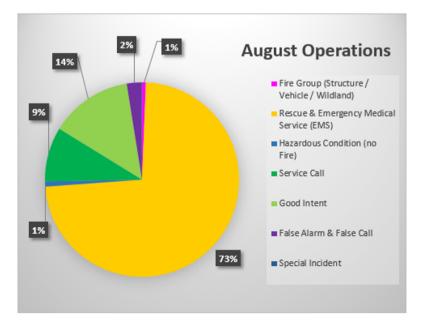

# ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT PROJECT MILESTONES:

1) Construction services for Marineland Acres - Pave, Resurface and Drainage for eight roads, approximately 3.7 miles 18.15% complete. Dewatering and installations of deep drainage structures along east side of Central Avenue ongoing north towards Atlantic Avenue. Also crossings for laterals at each intersecting roadway south of Atlantic for swale drainage to the Central Avenue trunk line.

2) Library Administrative Headquarters and Bunnell Branch Master planning kick-off occurred on August 23 for the design phase of the new County Library with an ancillary Multi-Purpose Room.

#### FREEDOM FEST (JULY 3) RECAP

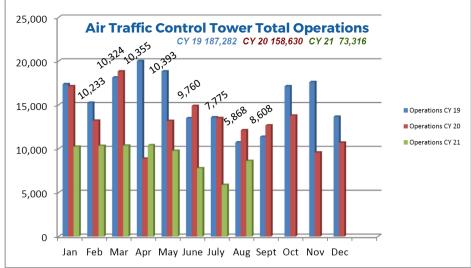
Freedom Fest, a salute to veterans both past and present, was attended by more than 10,000 people. It featured concerts, static vintage and modern military aircraft and vehicles, warbird flybys, remote control aircraft demonstrations, a car show, as well as plenty of food and beverage vendors. It was a great weekend to celebrate veterans and the freedoms they fought for.

#### EARLY LOAN PAYOFF

The BoCC authorized the early payoff of an Airport Capital and Executive Corporate Hangar Loan and the termination of its related swap agreement. The Board authorized this loan from Bank of America in the amount of \$2.8 million 2011 to finance and refinance certain capital improvements at the Flagler Executive Airport. A swap agreement was also attached to this loan for the interest. The outstanding principal balance was \$262,060 with outstanding interest and fees of \$12.316. This loan had 10 more principal and interest payments, with the last one scheduled for January 2024. The payoff increased the Airport's debt capacity for future capital projects.

#### CHAIR: FLORIDA AIRPORTS COUNCIL

Airport Director Roy Sieger was installed as the Chair of the Florida Airports Council (FAC) for the coming year. Sieger has been a member of the FAC for 15 years. He was appointed to the Board of Directors in 2016 and subsequently was appointed to the Executive Board in 2019. Florida Airports Council, is the largest airport-specific organization in Florida and is considered by industry leaders to be the premier airport organization in the nation.



#### FLAGLER EXECUTIVE AIRPORT PROJECT UPDATES

1) The Rehabilitation of Runway 06-24 is complete. All paving operations have been completed on the airfield. All new runway lights, guidance signs, and Runway End Identifier Lights (REILs) have been installed. The electrical vault is complete, to include the architectural punch walk. The new slide gate, gate operator, and card reader have been installed. Completed the runway grooving and full rate markings.

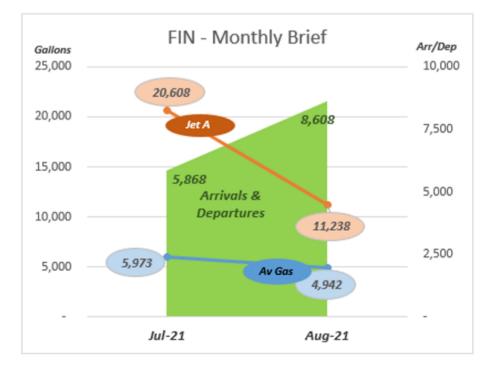
Project Cost: \$8,746,302 (FAA \$6,769,818, FDOT \$1,976,484)

2) Consultant Hoyle Tanner has completed the 90% design documents for the T-Hangar facilities. The Airport Director met with a representative to review the 90% design documents. Director Roy Sieger asked for changes to the restroom facilities and the new access road, which were reflected in the 90% design phase submittal.

Project Cost: \$117,000 (FDOT \$117,000)

3) Upcoming project to replace Air Traffic Control Tower (ATCT) Equipment. Two bids were received to replace ATCT Equipment that. The lowest bidder was CNC NAVTECH at \$343,304. The FDOT PTGA for this project is \$250,000, of which \$29,500 was paid to Hoyle Tanner to prepare the specifications and bid documents. and oversee the installation of the new equipment. Another \$122,804 has been requested from FDOT.

Project Cost: +/- \$372,804 (FDOT \$250,000 currently)

- 1) Relocated the Bunnell Branch to Marvin's Garden. Modifications to the facility were completed. All library furnishings, equipment, and materials were moved to the new location.
- 2) Southern Library Project New facility construction is anticipated for 2023. Meetings were held with Rhodes & Britto to discuss the master planning phase.

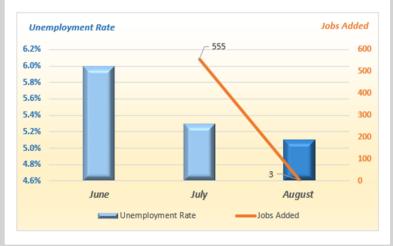

(As Flagler County received substantial rainfall towards the end of the summer, the roads and drainage systems saw severe water retention and extensive vegetative growth.

There were 83 work requests logged and 90% were completed. Road & Bridge monitored low areas in an attempt to stay ahead of the elements, but are over extended due to staffing shortages. As the weather dries up and the growing season slows down, attention can be more focused on cleaning out drainage areas and mowing. The priority ditch/swale cleaning schedule runs through February 2022.

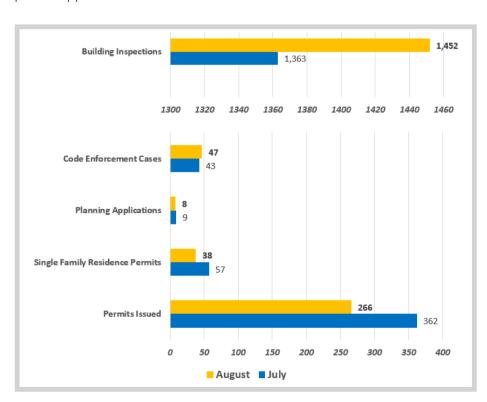
