EFFORTS ON TRACK TO HARMONIZE BUDGET WITH STRATEGIC PLAN FOR FY 2022-23

Commissioners, between the great efforts of you, our staff, and our consultant for strategic planning, Herb Marlowe of Analytica, I believe we will be successful in aligning our budget and staffing allocations to best provide the services that meet the needs of residents, businesses, and visitors for the upcoming fiscal year and well into the future.

With your input, Marlowe and a team of staff are working now on action steps for the objectives of the Economic Vitality module of the Strategic Plan that will take into account the areas identified through our public engagement meetings. Those areas include building a competitive advantage for Flagler County through a stronger commercial and industrial footprint, diversification of our housing to encourage entry level workers to live here, and protecting lands for agriculture and future industrial uses.

These action steps and the work required to accomplish them will – at some point in time – become budgetary decision units for departments.

Things are looking good with an anticipated property valuation increase of about \$12.3 million, and a pro rata share to the Board of County Commissioners general fund of \$7.5 million. This additional allocation for the coming year will cover some of our personnel requirements, capital improvement projects, rolling stock, operating increases, additional monies for CRAs, and several decision units for Fleet, Fire Rescue, Financial Services, Land Management, and Princess Place Preserve.

Once the Strategic Plan is finalized to encapsulate your vision for Flagler County – along with identifying the goals and objectives for our organization – we can further analyze our budget to ensure funding levels support the goals you are trying to achieve.

Great opportunities come with the transition for Flagler County as we make the shift from a small to a mid-size county. Departments will create five-year action plans that set defined strategies and attainable benchmarks, or key performance indicators, that will be communicated to the public.

We are putting Flagler FIRST (<u>F</u>iscally Accountable, <u>Innovative Solutions</u>, <u>R</u>esponsible Growth, <u>S</u>uperior Service, <u>T</u>ransparent Government) – making a difference.





LAND MANAGEMENT PROJECTS:

Land Management received a \$75,000 grant from the Resilient Florida Program that it applied for in August 2021. The grant is intended to fund a Resiliency Vulnerability Assessment for the County. The intention is to work with the Northeast Florida Regional Council to contract a consultant. The study must meet statutory requirements.

Land Management provided a tour to new Land Acquisition Committee members to show them some of the existing acquisition targets. The division also met with SJRWMD, St. Johns River Keeper, Private citizens and landowners to discuss acquisition potential of parcels along Lake Disston. Once a list is approved by the BoCC, the department will begin to acquire appraisals on top tier properties to move forward. Will also reach out to more landowners who may be willing sellers to the program.



FLAGLER EXECUTIVE AIRPORT PROJECT UPDATES

1) T-Hangars Construction. The contract for S.E. Cline Construction to construct the T-hangar project was approved in April. All parties have signed the contract. The County has advertised for Construction Engineering Inspection Services associated with the project. The RFQ submittals are due back on May 18. The project is anticipated to start in June 2022.


Project Cost: \$6,544,136 (FDOT \$5,889,723 and Airport \$654,413)

2) Replace Air Traffic Control Tower (ATCT) Equipment. CNC NAVTECH, LLC. has received a portion of the NAVCOM equipment for installation in the Air Traffic Control Tower. The contractor will test the equipment and anticipates all the equipment to be received/tested and ready for installation in September.

Project Cost: \$302,304 (FDOT \$302,304)

3) Design and Rehabilitation of Taxiway A. The final design for this project was completed in the month of April. The non-mandatory pre-bid meeting was held on May 11. A grant application to the FAA for funding will be submitted in May based on the lowest bid received. Construction is anticipated to start in October 2022.

Project Cost: \$185,000 (FAA \$185,000)



ENGINEERING PROJECT UPDATES

1) Flagler County Storm Water Master Plan, to identify potential improvements to the county's overall stormwater management program. The purpose of this project is specifically to mitigate flooding risks to roadways and roadway related infrastructure.

- Public coordination with residents to obtain input completed April 30.
- Develop stormwater infrastructure inventory.
- Review of stormwater code is forthcoming.
- Long-term goals: draft Master Plan = 60 weeks and final Master Plan = 72 weeks.

2) East Daytona North Paving Project, 3.3 miles. The project scope consists of roadway stabilization with asphaltic concrete pavement and associated stormwater improvements to include a 20 foot wide roadway and stabilized shoulders along various roadways. Completed field data gathering services (geotech and survey). Design concepts to be developed and discussed with County Engineering.

• Estimated design completion = November 30, 2022.

3) Marineland Acres, 3.7 miles - 8 Local Roads. Resurfacing and drainage improvements. Central Avenue storm trunk line installed. Dewatering and installations drainage structures along east side of Central Ave. and East Ocean St. ongoing and after connecting watermain on Central, Drainage installations on Surf will ensue, layout for swale grading, driveway drainage, construction has begun. Anticipated Construction Phase Schedule:

- Substantial Completion by April 22, 2023.
- Final completion by May 22, 2023.

4) MalaCompra Road Resurfacing, .73 miles from State Road A1A to the Atlantic Coast Beach. Design close-out completed, and construction bids received April 13. Work Authorization for CEI Services is to be included in the May BoCC meeting for approval. Long-term goals:

• Estimated completion is December 22, 2022.

5) Water Oak Road Paving Improvements, 2.5 miles from County Road 2006 to Mahogany Boulevard. Acquired Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and design documents have been sent to the Florida Department of Transportation for review.

- Anticipate Advertise to Bid in April 2022, Receive Bids and Award Contract in May 2022.
- Anticipate bringing funding agreement to BOCC in April 2022.






