RESILIENCY IN ACTION

Commissioners,

On September 28, Category 4 Hurricane Ian made landfall in southwest Florida, arriving in Flagler County as a tropical storm. Six weeks later, 500-mile-wide Hurricane Nicole made landfall near Vero Beach, and brought destructive surf, bands of heavy rain, and a repeat of tropical storm conditions to parts of Flagler County. In the 12 weeks since the first declared event, we also suffered the effects of

several low-end Nor'easters – one in conjunction with King Tides.

This is not the first time that the County's found itself in recovery mode. However, I don't know if I have ever witnessed the level of *coordination and collaboration* that's now taking place in our community, on so very many fronts, across a multitude of initiatives.

Homeowners' associations, volunteer groups, residents' grassroot efforts. Elected officials and staff from each of the municipalities. Flagler's Constitutional offices. Regional, state, and federal agencies including SJRWMD, SFWMD, FDOT, FDEP, FDEM, FDEO, FWC, US Army Corps of Engineers, and FEMA. *All* of these are presently working to move the needle on Flagler County's path forward.

Brigadier General Hibner, FDOT Secretary John Tyler, FDEP Secretary Shawn Hamilton, Chief Resiliency Officer Wesley Brooks, Emergency Management Director Kevin Guthrie, House Speaker Paul Renner, Senator Travis Hutson, Congressman Mike Waltz, and Governor Ron DeSantis have all put feet-on-the-street in Flagler County.

Providing transparency as Flagler progresses from 'challenge to solution' of course demands detailed, accurate documentation. But present efforts have expanded. In addition to the necessary interface of forms and applications, your staff, and all whose involvement I've noted above, have moved initiatives from the strictly bureaucratic into the territory of fellowship. These relational collaborations allow us to quickly communicate the desired outcome and bring a focus and efficiency to the efforts.

And as you know, our resiliency efforts extend beyond our beaches. As envisioned in your 2022 Strategic Plan and articulated in your 2022 and 2023 Legislative and Funding Priorities, a resilient Flagler County is resilient on many fronts: from the health of our shorelines to a safe and healthy environment (water and wastewater), expanding infrastructure for a robust and varied local economy (Commerce Drive), a connected community (countywide broadband), protected conservation areas, and thoughtfully planned amenities (parks and recreation strategy).

We know that the heavy lifting will continue into the coming months and beyond. Staff and I will continue to keep you updated. Thank you for your guidance,



<u>AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL TOWER EQUIPMENT</u> - Only remaining installation is the backup weather system, slated for December 2022.




